## 1. Introduction

The present work is the second volume of a supplement to Koert van der Horst's *Illuminated and decorated manuscripts of the University Library Utrecht* (The Hague 1989).<sup>1</sup> Apart from giving a basic description of 181 medieval manuscripts, Van der Horst classifies their illumination and decoration and supplies his overview with 741 images. His study caters for a detailed overview of the most important medieval manuscripts in the collection seen from an art historian's point of view.

In 2011, a project was started to provide a supplement to Van der Horst's overview. This supplement will not only present the manuscripts that the University Library of Utrecht acquired since 1989, but also a significant number of illuminated and decorated manuscript fragments and maculature in possession of the library.<sup>2</sup> The research for this supplement was carried out by students in a traineeship at the University Library of Utrecht. These traineeships lasted for about two months, making it impossible to cover all the material at once. Hence, a series of three volumes has been planned, to be published as pdfs on the website of Special Collections of the University Library of Utrecht. The first volume of the supplement contains all manuscripts acquired between 1989 and 2011 and a number of loose manuscript fragments; this second volume of the supplement presents the remaining loose fragments and covers a number of fragments (maculature) still bound in the manuscripts and early printed books; a third supplement will finish the work in this last category.

Since we are presenting a supplement to Van der Horst's overview, his guidelines on how to select material and how to process the outcomes were taken as a starting point. Some of his selection criteria could easily be implemented in our work, such as the choice not to include manuscripts written after 1550. Other criteria, especially concerning illumination and decoration, led to some discussion. In his introduction, Van der Horst states that he only includes manuscripts which contain some form of decoration other than decorated initials,

which in practice means that all manuscripts with some kind of marginal decoration, even simple baguettes or a so-called 'J-list', are included.<sup>3</sup> We have followed this rule, but since there are many manuscript fragments with parts of 'J-lists', we have only selected clear examples with elaborate penwork and *littera duplices*. Yet we have included fragments with minor initials decorated with faces or masks or made of gold.

We chose to fully adhere to the classification system used by Van der Horst for images and decoration. This system is as follows:

A – Miniatures.

A' – Drawings related to the text, such as tombstones, surgical instruments, ground plans, etc.

B – Historiated initials with an illustration related to the text.

B' – Historiated initial with an illustration unrelated to the text, such as human figures (grotesque or otherwise), fabulous animals, etc.

C – Marginal scenes related to the text, including coats of arms.

D – Border decorations. The occurrence of drolleries within this category is stated at all times, the most important being described.

E – Elaborated and/or painted decorated initials, with pen-flourishes in the margin.

F – Decorated initials, with pen-flourishes in the margin.

G – Elaborated and/or painted decorated initials.

H – Decorated initials.

I – Miscellaneous, e.g. drawings on paste-downs, inserted engravings and woodcuts, etc.

In practice, the categories A to C in this list do not occur in our supplement. Since this is the case, the application of Iconclass-numbers is futile. The system for the description of manuscripts used by Van der Horst is taken over with some minor changes. These changes consist mostly of the omitting of categories that are not applicable to the fragmentary material dealt with here, namely *Scribe*, *Binding* and *Artist*. In the case of maculature, the title and other data of the manuscript or edition in which it was found are mentioned under

*Provenance.* Having considered these changes, the descriptions consist of the following elements:

- The catalogue number for the item in question, the name or number ascribed to the fragment/maculature in the University Library of Utrecht,<sup>4</sup> and the numbers for the plates as presented below.
- The name or title of the text of the fragment/maculature, if possible with the name of the original author. The texts are in Latin, unless it is explicitly indicated that this is not the case.
- Approximations of place or date of origin.
- Information on the structure of the fragment/maculature: writing material, number of leaves, measurements of the leaves followed by the measurements of the writing area, and finally, if more than one, the number of columns. If there is a medieval or modern foliation or pagination this has been noted. Otherwise one folio is numbered fol. 1, a bifolium or several leaves of one manuscript A, B, C, etc., according to the order they would have had in the original manuscript.
- *Script* in which the fragment/maculature is written (possibly more than one). Here, in line with Van der Horst, the nomenclature of Prof. G.I. Lieftinck and Prof. J.P. Gumbert is usually followed.<sup>5</sup>
- *Provenance:* All known successive owners of each item; in the case of maculature the data of the manuscript or edition in which it was found.
- *Decoration:* The illuminations and decorations of the fragment/maculature, classified by letters A – I as given above.
- *Literature:* All known references to the fragment/maculature are given here.
- *Note:* Other noteworthy features or necessary information. If the fragment has been trimmed due to use as fly-leaf, book cover or otherwise, this has been noted.

Someone who's name frequently appears under *Provenance* is Huybert Edmond van Buchell (1513-1599). He was canon of the chapter of St. Mary's in Utrecht until 1584 and spent a

large part of his life in Cologne.<sup>6</sup> Over two thousand printed books in the University Library of Utrecht stem from his legacy, and six fragments or maculature described, belong or once belonged to Van Buchell's collection.<sup>7</sup>

We have chosen to present our findings by separating two categories: the first category covers loose fragments, the second maculature in bindings. Both categories are directly followed by their plates. Within these categories, the fragments/maculature are listed according to the hierarchy of the decoration (in practice from the classification D downwards), not by chronology as in Van der Horst. The numbering of the fragments is continued from the first volume, and starts at nr. 15, fig. 45.

Finally, we would like to thank the people who provided assistance during our research. First of all, we want to thank Willemijn van Klingereren and Tino Oudesluijs for the work they did on this project: their volume of the supplement served as a very useful guideline. We would also like to express our gratitude towards Dr Martine Meuwese and Dr Gisela Gerritsen-Geywitz, who were so kind to share their expertise with us, and Joost van Heijst, who provided us with valuable information on father Van Scheijndel. All fragments were used as book-covers (somewhat trimmed), with at least four of them for the series *Cursus theologiae morales* by Reinerus Sasserath, which are now not included in the Thomaasse collection. A later added note in the margin of folio 7.23 refers to the founding of the abbey of Herkenrode near Hasselt in Belgian Limburg.








