
## Imagining the Nation's Nature

Jan Christiaan Sepp's Illustrated Book Series on Dutch Birds (1770-1829) Esther van Gelder After years of collecting and describing exotic curiosities, the late 18<sup>th</sup> century Dutch Republic discovered its national nature. My research reveals how a concerned engraver-publisher played a crucial role in transforming natural history into a useful and patriotic endeavor.



## CASE: THE BIRDS OF THE NETHERLANDS (5 VOL., 1770-1829)

In 1770 - years before Audubon's well-known *The Birds of America* (1827-1838) - the publisher Jan Christiaan Sepp and the Remonstrant preacher Cornelis Nozeman initiated a pioneering series on Dutch birds. The 'nationality' of the birds was proven by the life-size and colored depiction of wild species with their nests and eggs.



## **THEMES**

- THE ARTIST-ENTREPRENEUR J.C. Sepp (1739-1811) was an engraver and bookseller from Amsterdam. He specialized in **natural history**, and became famous for his book series with excellent hand-colored **engravings**. He closely **collaborated** with other amateur-naturalists.
- TRANSFORMING NATURAL HISTORY In a strong tradition of collecting exotics indoors, Sepp and his authors instead stressed the value of useful knowledge of the national flora and fauna gathered in the field. Their central aim was to examine the benefits of local nature for society.





 SCIENCE IN SOCIETY Sepp's natural history books should be understood as tools of improvement and nation building. He and his authors belonged to learned societies concerned with the political, economic and cultural decline of the Dutch Republic.

## **RESEARCH METHOD & INNOVATIVE ASPECTS**

- **RECONSTRUCT** the late 18th-century naturalist world through books, correspondence, and archives
- ANALYSE natural history books as collaborative products and a bimedial genre (relation text & image)
- INTERPRET natural history in cultural framework (Enlightened societies, book market, nation building)
